

School Uniform Policy

Introduction

It is our school policy that all children wear school uniform when attending school, or when participating in a school-organised event outside normal school hours. We provide a complete list of the items needed in our School Prospectus which is available to download from the school website (www.trinityallsaintsbingley.org.uk). Alternatively, a full uniform list may be obtained from the school office.

Aims and objectives

Our policy on school uniform is based on the notion that school uniform:

- promotes a sense of pride in the school
- engenders a sense of community and belonging towards the school
- is practical and smart;
- identifies the children with the school
- prevents children from coming to school in fashion clothes that could be distracting in class
- makes children feel equal to their peers in terms of appearance
- is regarded as suitable wear for school and good value for money by most parents
- is designed with health and safety in mind
- minimises opportunities for children to bully others

Key roles and responsibilities Statement of Intent

It is the policy of the School and its Governors that school uniform creates a neat, personal appearance and a sense of pride and belonging, which together promotes an image of the school that comes to be recognised and respected. The school looks for full parental support and co-operation in this matter.

1.

- 1.1. The Governing Body has overall responsibility for reviewing the School Uniform Policy at least every two years.
- 1.2. The Headteacher has responsibility for handling complaints regarding this policy as outlined in the school's Complaints Policy.
- 1.3. The Headteacher will be responsible for the day-to-day implementation and management of the School Uniform Policy and procedures of Trinity All Saints CE Primary.

School Uniform Requirements

- 1.4. The school uniform is purple sweatshirt / cardigan embroidered with the school logo (Reception – Year 5) and navy sweatshirt / cardigan embroidered with the school logo (Year 6).
- 1.5. Although it is recommended that children wear uniform embroidered with the school logo, unbranded, plain equivalent items in the same colours are also acceptable.
- 1.6. Autumn Spring term:
- Grey/black skirt, pinafore dress or trousers.
- White polo shirt.
- Purple sweatshirt or cardigan embroidered with the school logo (navy for Year 6), or plain and unbranded.
- Plain white or grey ankle or knee-length socks. During the winter months, plain grey tights may be worn.
- Flat, black, closed-toe school shoes.
- Purple book bag or rucksacks are available although other sensible school bags are allowed (please note children are not to bring their own equipment/pencil cases to school).
- Smart coat.
- 1.7. Summer term (optional):
- Lilac gingham dress (navy gingham dress for Year 6) or grey/black skirt or pinafore dress with white polo shirt.
- Grey/black, long or short trousers with white polo shirt

Physical Education. Children should come wearing their PE Kit on the days PE is timetabled. No sandals should be worn

White t-shirt and black shorts.

Plain black or white pumps for indoors and plain black or white trainers for outdoor games

Plain black / navy blue tracksuit for outdoor PE

Swimming kit will be needed in Year 3

- 1.8. Hair must be neat and tidy and worn with no extremes of style or colour.
- 1.9. Make-up and cosmetics are not appropriate for school and must not be worn except in exceptional circumstances e.g. to cover scarring.
- 1.10. All clothes must be clearly labelled with the pupil's name.

Jewellery

On health and safety grounds we do not allow children to wear jewellery in our school. The exceptions to this rule are ear-ring studs in pierced ears, and a wrist watch in Key Stage 2. Jewellery is not permitted during P.E. lessons for health and safety reasons. We ask the children to either remove these objects during PE and games, or cover them with a plaster, to prevent them from causing injury. Teachers are not permitted to help with the removal of jewellery.

Footwear

The school wants all children to grow into healthy adults. We believe that it is dangerous for children to wear shoes that have platform soles or high heels, so we do not allow children to wear such shoes in our school. Neither do we allow children to wear trainers to school, unless it is their PE day; this is because we think that this footwear is appropriate for sport or for leisurewear, but is not in keeping with the smart appearance of a school uniform. We require all children to wear black shoes as stated in the uniform list.

The role of parents

We ask all parents who send their children to our school to support the school uniform policy. We believe that parents have a duty to send their children to school correctly dressed and ready for their daily schoolwork. One of the responsibilities of parents is to ensure that their child has the correct uniform, and that it is clean and in good repair.

The role of governors

The governing body supports the headteacher in implementing the school uniform policy. It considers all representations from parents regarding the uniform policy and liaises with the headteacher to ensure that the policy is implemented fairly and with sensitivity.

Monitoring and review

The governing body monitors and reviews the school uniform policy through its committee work by:

- seeking the views of parents, to ensure that they agree with and support the policy;
- considering, with the headteacher, any requests from parents for individual children to have special dispensation with regard to school uniform;
- requiring the headteacher to report to the governors on the way the school uniform policy is implemented.
